### Outstanding Performances by HCS Vocalists

On January 24th, Hammondsport High School chorus members who wanted to audition for this vear's All County Chorus, sang at the Prattsburgh Vocal Festival for an adjudicator. Our soloists began preparing for this event in October when they selected a solo from the New York State School of Music Association's (NYSSMA) manual. Hundreds of solos are categorized in the manual by degree of difficulty, with level 1 being the easiest and level 6 being the most difficult. At Prattsburgh, solo vocalists from Steuben County were given scores on how well they sang their solos and how well they can sight-sing music. Our students did very well. Seven out of eight Hammondsport students received a rating of 94% or higher.

Several notable performances include Kelly Perz who sang "Habanera" (lvl 6) from the opera "Carmen" and received a rating of 96%. Kelly plans on taking her solo to the NYSSMA adjudication in April so that she can be considered for participation in next year's All-State Chorus. Jessica Anthony gave an outstanding performance singing "Sure on this Shining Night" (lvl 5) by Samuel Barber and received a 99%. Micah Armstrong received the only perfect rating in the county with his performance of "Some Enchanted Evening" (lvl 5) from the musical "South-Pacific." The following students passed their auditions and will sing in this year's All County Festival: CeJae Scotchmer, Kelly Perz, Nick Hopkins and Micah Armstrong will sing in the Mixed Chorus and Jessica Anthony and Bethany Leggett will sing in the Women's Chorus.

## From the Desk of HS Principal Tad Rounds

Special congratulations to our Senior High Art Teacher Gina Pfleegor. Mrs. Pfleegor has been selected by McGraw Hill to illustrate a new children's book entitled; *Where Are You, Boots?*. This is the second children's book Mrs. Pfleegor has illustrated.

A few procedural reminders to parents include address changes and student dress. Parents are asked to contact the main office with any address change or phone number change to ensure prompt delivery of school communications. Parents are also asked to ensure their son/daughter's compliance with the school dress code as delineated in the School Code of Conduct. Listed are the major provisions:

- Be safe, appropriate, and not disrupt or interfere with the educational process. **Pajama apparel is not appropriate**.
- Recognize that extremely brief garments such as tube tops, net tops, halter tops, spaghetti straps, plunging necklines front and/or back, clothing that reveals midriff, and see-through garments are not appropriate.
- Ensure that underwear is completely covered with outer clothing.
- Skirts should extend to the end of the fingertips. Shorts should extend to the end of the thumbs.
- Include footwear at all times. Footwear that is a safety hazard will not be allowed.
- Not include the wearing of hats, bandanas (as head coverings), or other head gear in the school buildings from 7:45 a.m. to 3:20 p.m. on school days unless part of a recognized religious practice, special school activity, medical purpose, or permission from the principal.
- Not include items that are vulgar, obscene, libelous, or denigrate others on account of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability.
- Not promote and/or endorse the use of alcohol, tobacco, or illegal drugs, and/or encourage other illegal or violent activities.

Upcoming events in February include the Jazz and Solo Concert scheduled for February 11th. The Winter Ball is scheduled for February 28th and the next Parent Liaison Meeting will be February 24th at 7:00 PM in the Senior High Library.
