


Glenn Curtiss Elementary Announces Leading Lakers for December


Leading Lakers students are announced on the morning announcements on Fridays and posted on the sign out front for all of the community to see. In addition, the PTO awards each student a book.

Budget Development Update

What a time to be in the business of educating children. As everyone is probably aware, the Governor's initial budget proposal calls for Hammondsport to receive a \$376,000 or 9.57% reduction in State Aid for the upcoming 2009-2010 school year. This percentage reduction in State Foundation Aid is the highest in the area. Should this reduction be sustained, the District will be forced to make some very serious decisions. According to the Governor's budget statement, the reduction was based on the school district's "ability to pay." This is yet another example of land wealth being mistaken for income wealth.

In the coming months we will be looking at every area of our budget and developing a long-term plan to deal with the difficult years to come. I encourage everyone to attend our Board meetings which are held the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 7pm in the High School Library. The State is coming out with new proposals almost daily and almost all of them will have an impact on the budget and programming here at Hammondsport.



From the Bus Garage

Our procedure for determining a delayed opening or school closing must be done early enough to contact the parents, media and staff. I speak with the area road supervisors to determine the road conditions on the hills, how



far along their plows are in their areas and if they feel the roads are clear enough for us to open school. After their report, I call the Superintendent who is in touch with other area Superintendents and we determine what

course of action we will take. The drivers are extremely cautious in

snowy conditions and drive defensively. We don't

worry about getting to school on time in these road conditions, we worry about getting the children to school safely. We need parents to remember the buses weigh much more than their family car (about 19,000 lbs. empty), there are dual wheels and brand new snow tires on all the buses.

Please be advised there are times when some roads are not plowed and we are not able to reach our students, but that is up to the drivers to determine. We will do everything we can to bring all students into school, but will not compromise the safety of a bus load of children to attempt a road the driver determines has not been plowed or sanded. We ask all parents to have their phones on and working as we will attempt to call you if the bus cannot get to you. Also, please have an emergency plan in place for your children to follow if the bus cannot get to them (such as a neighbor who they can go to or call, mom's and dad's work numbers, the

transportation department's phone number, a babysitter's phone number, etc). If you have any questions, please call me at 569-5200 x5283.



Community Use of School Facilities Policy Update

This year the Board of Education is going through a policy audit and reviewing and approving over 100 of the current Board of Education policies that govern the District. The Community Use of School Facilities policy is one of the policies being reviewed. The current policy was first approved on January 20, 1998 and was last reviewed in 2006. The use policy outlines what outside organizations must do in order to use school facilities responsibly, while protecting the interests and assets of the District. At this time, a subcommittee will be working to evaluate our current policy and make recommendations that will be presented to the Board of Education at their February meeting. All Board policies are available in the District Office for review by the public.

This is one of the many classroom activities which provide Spanish learners the opportunity to apply language abilities across content areas.
