The Fresh Perspectives Team was able to meet with 47 people during their time in the District and the feedback and insight will be extremely useful as we move forward.

The budget development process has concluded and the proposed budget will go before the Board at the regular meeting on April 8. ment of a District level Strategic Plan that will help guide Hammondsport Central School for the next 5 to 10 years.



## **Curtiss School Closing Q & A**

Below are recent questions received from parents and community members regarding the Curtiss School closing with responses from Mr. Bower. We will continue to include questions we receive and the answers in future Laker Lines in an effort to keep everyone informed.

### Q: Is the Curtiss Building still planning to be closed beginning September 2010?

A: Yes, it is.

**Q: When will students begin moving down to the Main St campus?** A: The 4th grade homerooms will be moved to Main Street this summer. The 5th and 6th grade homerooms will come down in the summer of 2010. Bringing down 4th grade before next year will help us stagger the workload on our maintenance staff to ensure that all deadlines are met.

#### Q: Will the District have to spend a great deal of money to add on/ remodel the Main Street building?

A: There has been money budgeted of less than \$150,000 in the 2009-10 budget to purchase new classroom equipment, remodel classroom and office spaces, and create a new library space for the Elementary Classes. Our goal is to create classroom spaces prepared for what learning will look like for 20-30 years to come, not simply move people into old, open classrooms with outdated equipment.

### Q: How will all of the students fit in the Main Street building?

A: During the 2002-2003 school year there were approximately 600 students K-3/7-12 located at the Main Street campus. When the move to the Main Street campus is complete, our student population is anticipated to be approximately 560 students Pre K-12. Although the uses of some classroom spaces will be changed, we have the space to house all essential classes on one campus.

### Q: What will be the biggest obstacle with only one building?

A: Right now, it is having only one large gym space at the Main Street campus. If we can find tenants to lease the Curtiss Building and maintain possession of it, our teams will have the gym space to use for practices. If the building is closed or sold, we would lose that space and our sports programs would be affected. Indoor teams such as volleyball and basketball would have shorter, consolidated practices and may not be able to practice at all on days when there are games for other levels. In terms of meeting mandates, we have created a K-12 physical education schedule that will meet all State Education Physical Education requirements using the spaces that we will have so that will not be an issue.

## Section V Awards HCS Senior




Congratulations to Senior Ricci Wendlant for receiving the Thomas and Helen Hage Memorial Boys' Basketball Scholarship.

The last HCS student to receive this prestigious award was Aaron Brown in 2002.




## Glenn Curtiss Elementary Announces Leading Lakers for March
