

## Malone Vies for National Cheerleader of the Year

Congratulations to Senior Cheerleader Stephanie Malone who recently learned she is a finalist for the title of National Cheerleader of the Year.

Steph was nominated by her coach, Ami Corell, who submitted her high school transcript, resume of cheerleading career, and a video of Stephanie to a selection committee comprised of leaders in the cheerleading and spirit industry from all over the country. The selection committee then narrowed the field to 50 semi-finalists.
As a semi-finalist, the nominee must submit a portfolio made-up of: 1) letters of reference from the coach, a school administrator, and a community member/business leader, 2) personal resume, 3) written statement of why she should be considered for the award, 4) an essay on a topic provided by the selection committee, 5) a DVD interview of the nominee using questions provided by the selection committee, 6) a DVD of required cheer skills, 7) additional pages of pictures, scrapbooks, awards or anything else the nominee wants to include. The nominees must then complete a phone interview with one of the members of the selection committee before the finalists are chosen. Based on Stephanie's portfolio and her interview, she was chosen as one of the ten finalists!
When she competes for the title, her score from all of the preliminary phases is used as $25 \%$ of her overall score, then she will complete two different panel interviews that each

## What Does the School Board

Do, Anyway?<br>by BOE President Jim Zimar

Years ago, a newly elected board member was approached by a parent who was upset because the school board had not ordered new socks for the soccer team. The green trustee listened quietly--unsure of what to say--until the parent finished and left.
What should the board member have done? Could the board member have ordered the socks? Should the board have ordered the socks? What does the school board do, anyway?
The school board has three main jobs:

1) Pay the district's share of the cost of educating our children with the revenue from real property tax.
2) Hire the superintendent and evaluate the superintendent's performance. The superintendent reports to the board. Everyone else who works for our district reports (directly or indirectly) to the superintendent.
3) Decide school district policy. Policy is a set of written guidelines saying what the district will and will not do or allow. Much of this policy is written to comply with state and federal laws and regulations.
Also, the school board has authority only when acting as a unit. Individual board members do not have the authority to act alone. The new board member had no authority to order socks for the soccer team, and it was not the board's job to order the socks, either.
What should a board member do in such a situation? A board member should certainly listen. A board member should use the opportunity to teach about the role of the board and the roles of other people in the district. A board member should ask the parent to seek a solution near the problem. In this case, the student and the parent should talk with the coach first. If they don't reach an understanding, the athletic director should be brought into the discussion. The next step involves the building principal. The superintendent is next, and then the school board. A genuine attempt must be made close to the situation first and at each successive step. Going straight to the top should lead to starting at the beginning. A board member should also inform the superintendent so that the superintendent can follow the

One of the favorite parts of my day is having lunch in the cafeteria with the students. As a teacher I usually ate with my students, just to share some conversation that wasn't related to grades and academics. I wanted to know them as young people. I continued to value that time as a principal and I continue to do it as much as possible in this new role. Today I had the pleasure of eating with two $3^{\text {rd }}$ grade students. I usually try to engage the kids in conversation about what's going on with them, what they've learned that day, or any conversation they want to have. As we all know, the art of dinner time conversation is getting lost. One word answers such as fine, good, and nothing always seem to dominate the conversation, never at these lunch conversations however.
I have known both of these $3^{\text {rd }}$ grade students for many years. We've had many conversations before. Today one of them couldn't stop talking about his grades and what he's learning. In math it's all about division. The teacher is using a computer to write on and what she writes goes right up on the screen. I asked him if he thought the computer tablet helped him. He says it's easier for him to read and it helps him understand because he can see it on the board and in his mind. He really enjoys math now and his grade is in the 90 's.

He's also very proud of his reading grade. We talked about how hard reading was for him last year, he easily got upset and he really struggled. Now his grade was in the 80 's and he's remembering the things he reads about. I ask him what he thinks the difference is between last year and this year. He answers quickly, "This year I listen." I thought about his answer briefly and then said to him, things always work out better when you listen. I gave him a high five and we both tucked our napkins in our milk carton and took our trays up. Rules are rules.
Listening is hard. Of all the academic skills that we teach in our classrooms, this is a life skill that is perhaps the most difficult of all. Listening isn't hearing. We usually hear what is being said to us, but many times we don't listen. Over the next month I'm going to make a conscious effort to do more listening. I challenge you to have a conversation at the dinner table between Little League and homework. Turn off the radio in the car. Take a walk together with no IPODS or Playstation. Talk with your child, a student, a coworker, or a friend and don't just hear what they say, but really listen. Things always work out better that way.

The District is still working to find agencies that may want to lease space in the Curtiss building beginning July 1, 2010. A promotional brochure is being produced that will be sent out to area colleges, government agencies, community groups, and BOCES that will showcase the building and all it has to offer. We will be working over the next year to continue to find tenants for the Curtiss building that will bring in revenue to offset the expense of operating the building. The classroom spaces are no longer needed due to our current enrollment of 560 students and that was the basis of the Board of Education's decision last year to move to one campus in 2009-2010.

## EXCEL Project

Construction meetings have begun and we are on schedule to begin EXCEL project work in June. We will be starting before school is out by installing some of the card swipe door systems and video monitors. Workers will be in the Main Street Building in the evenings running wires through ceilings and handling other infrastructure work. The Curtiss Building will be closed to the public and all outside events beginning July 1. Asbestos abatement will begin at that time. We hope to have all work complete so teachers can begin preparing their classrooms in mid-August. Plans are being finalized to provide a covered entry into the Elementary Wing of the Main Street Campus. This will tie into the sidewalk replacement project and will provide a safer entry/ exit point for students, staff and visitors. The EXCEL money from the State is targeted aid that must be used for very specific improvements such as these. All of these components are part of the EXCEL building project approved by the voters in 2007. There is no tax levy impact as a result of the EXCEL work to be done this summer.

## Shared Services

On April 24, the District and the Village of Hammondsport collaborated to plant three trees in the area once occupied by the old bus garage. The District purchased one of the trees and received one from the Village Beautification Committee and one from Arbor Development. The tree received from Arbor Development was replanted in honor of a former student, Ryan French, whose original memorial tree was planted in the village and accidentally destroyed. Members of the Garden Club, Ms. Waterstraat's $3^{\text {rd }}$ grade class, as well as Ryan's family were on hand to fill in the dirt and get the trees off to a good start.
