Although the focus of these meetings was to listen to thoughts about the Curtiss School, there were discussions about state aid, property values, course offerings, and consolidation. With the state of the economy today, there is no doubt that our community is hurting and people are struggling to maintain their standard of living. Another purpose of these meetings was to keep the lines of communication open between the community and the District. We make every effort to be an efficient organization that provides a high quality education to our students. I hope to continue area "Town Hall" type meetings as we begin the budget development process. Stay tuned to dates and locations in upcoming editions of Laker Lines. Below is a summary of the information shared with those people that attended the Town Hall meetings. A complete outline of what was covered at the meetings can be found on our website www.hammondsportcsd.org.

Budget Impact of Curtiss School Closure
a. Reduction of operational costs which are approx \$72,000 in 2009-2010 dollars
b. Staffing costs would be reduced by $\$ 52,918$ in 2009-2010 dollars
c. Soft cost reductions seen in transportation, maintenance supplies, maintenance projects, and other areas. However they would be minimal.
d. Realized savings from the closure of the Curtiss building of approx $\$ 135,000$ in 20102011.
e. What are the increased costs?
i. Storage issues
ii. Need to send certain programs off campus, BOCES costs

## Possible Board decisions

a. Lease or rental to outside groups, income to offset expenses
b. Sale of Property: Establish Reserve for Tax Reduction, may be used up to 10 years after sale

## NYSMidde School Confeerence

Recently, staff from both Curtiss Elementary and the Junior High attended the New York State Middle School Association's annual conference. Held in Watkins Glen this year, the twoday conference focused on the often-overlooked middle grades, and highlighted best practices from across the state. This year, Hammondsport was fortunate to be represented by seven presenting teachers: Brande Flaitz, Barbara Demmin, Joanne LeClair, Heather Luther, Rhonda Underhill, Rachel McLoud, and John Kloiber.
Barbara Demmin presented two workshops on technology integration at the middle school level. Both sessions were well received and well attended. The first session, Using Glogster in the 6-8 Classroom, was filled to capacity. Participants had the opportunity to actually create an interactive, multi-media poster for use in their classroom. For the second session, a work shop on the use of Voice Thread in the $6-8$ Classroom was presented. This was a great opportunity to show the middle school educational community some of the technology projects we use here at Hammondsport Central School.
Brande Flaitz gave an interactive presentation based on the theory of pi. Two groups participated in different class activities that they could do with students in order to celebrate Pi Day (March 14). A group favorite was beading the values of pi to make a bracelet and show how pi is an irrational number (never ending).
John Kloiber's presentation drew a capacity crowd. A humorous approach to classroom management, John's presentation focused on staying positive and encouraging while holding students to a high standard of both work and behavior. Thanks to popular demand, Mr. Kloiber has been asked to present on this subject again at next year's conference in Rochester, NY.
Another capacity crowd could be found with Rachel McLoud. Her presentation focused on five-minute strategies for students to use who are having difficulty with math concepts.
Joanne LeClair's poetry workshop gave teachers the chance to learn about and participate in a poetry unit taught in the eighth grade English classes.
Sixth grade teachers Heather Luther and Rhonda Underhill co -presented on guided reading practices. Their session focused on helping teachers from other school districts implement a reading program that they have found to be successful in their classes at HCS.

1. Open your internet browser and go to www.hammondsportcsd.org
2. Sign in to the site if you have an account. If you don't, please register for one. Once you have registered for an account, you need to click on "sign in" which is in the upper right hand corner of the screen and proceed to sign in.
3. Click on access info in the upper right hand corner of the screen.
4. On the access info page, please scroll to the bottom of the page where it says "My E-Alerts and Subscriptions."
5. Please type in your 10 digit mobile number, no spaces or hyphens please.
6. Please select your carrier. If your carrier is not listed, you will not be able to subscribe to the server. We do not choose who is on the list, these are the providers that are compatible with our system.
7. Please check if you want all "E-Alerts" to go to your phone or only emergency "E-Alerts". Emergency "E-Alerts" are school closings, delays, or other emergency issues. Standard "E-Alerts" are a new game is scheduled or postponed, a schedule change is made for a specific sport that you have subscribed to. If you only want emergency alerts, please click yes. If you want all alerts, please click no.
8. Click submit and the process is finished.

We will use this system to get out District information quickly and efficiently as often as necessary. We hope you take advantage of this new service to stay in tune with news at HCS.
