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# "A Christmas Carol" Kicks off the Holiday Season

Students in the 7 – 12 Grade Drama Club performed John Jakes' touring adaptation of Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* November 13 and 14 in the Main Street School's auditorium. Presented as an ensemble production, cast members were responsible for finding their own costumes, hand props and make-up. Families also helped with finding set pieces, such as chairs and coat racks, while students in the ACE Introduction to Theatre class made additional set pieces. Cameron Wade designed the grandfather clock, and Mattie Catherman designed the lamp post; Rachel Armstrong, Breeana Brewer and Alysia Hilligus assisted in the construction of

those items as well as cemetery stones for one of the final scenes and handling publicity and ticket sales. Austin Wise designed and ran the lights for the production. Cast members operated the stick puppets providing special effects during scenes involving spirits, and then actually wore the masks during Scrooge's repenting scene near the end of the play. Trevor Parke portrayed a very convincing Ebenezer Scrooge, while Mattie Catherman created smooth transitions between scenes as the charming Charles Dickens, as well as Scrooge's tender fiancée, Belle. In fact, most of the cast took on multiple roles, and did an excellent job distinguishing each as a separate character. Newcomers Chandler Von Rhedey, portraying Bob Cratchit and Young Ebenezer; and Katrina Mc Gregor, portraying the Head Mistress and Mrs. Cratchit, had a successful debut on the Hammondsport stage. Morgan Sincerbox, Jacob Marley Fred, and a Businessman; Jessica Anthony, Ghost of Christmas Past and a Waif; and Susan Sincerbox, Ghost of Christmas Present, Sara, and a mother, all provided the other-worldly atmosphere for which this story is famous. Rounding out the cast

were Annie Stone as Belinda Cratchit, Fan, and a child; Zayna Hartman as the Host, Fezziwig, a Businessman and Gentleman of Charity, and Street Boy with the Turkey; Cameron Wade also as the Beggar; and Arianna Turner also as the Child Ebenezer, Dick, and lovable Tiny Tim who manages to capture Scrooge's heart and compassion. ## HCS Teaching Assistant Lends a "Warm" Hand to Troops Overseas

On Wednesday, November 25, Jan Harrington, a teaching/ technology assistant at HCS, participated in an American Red Cross annual event to assemble care packages to send to servicemen and women in Iraq and Afghanistan. Students from East High School in Corning, as well as other area volunteers, packed boxes to be sent to soldiers in time for the Christmas holiday.

Jan became involved in the project when she learned that her future son-in-law would be going to Iraq for a oneyear tour. Wanting to help out in some way, she found a knitting pattern for something called glomitts, which are fingerless gloves with a mitten type cover to go over the fingers when needed. When the mitten is pulled back, the fingers are free to move. She thought it would be nice to do something for the soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan by knitting pairs of glomitts. Jan enlisted the knitting talents of Nancy Drum, a regular volunteer at Hammondsport Central School, and Barbara Brayer, a retired Teaching Assistant

at Hammondsport. Jan, Nancy, and Barb made a total of 27 pairs of glomitts throughout the summer and fall.

As the knitting progressed, Jan contacted the American Red Cross to find out how the glomitts could be delivered

### New Course in ACE Accounting Offered to Qualifying Juniors and Seniors at HCS

Offering community college courses, for which high school students receive both college and high school credit toward graduation, is a common trend benefitting the institutions and the students who qualify to take these classes. It is also an excellent way to save money as the cost of college tuition rises each year. For each course, we follow the same curriculum and use the same textbooks as the college.

New this year, ACE Accounting 1030 is offered to students who have successfully completed the high school course Accounting I. They use the textbook entitled, *Financial Accounting*, and utilize online learning tools. The course objectives are:

• Explain and apply the basic objectives, principles, and procedures of accounting in the preparation, analysis, and interpretation of general purpose financial statements

merchandising entities

• Analyze financial accounting issues and theories rationally and logically using both qualitative and quantitative information

• Measure and report assets and liabilities

This is an excellent elective for anyone considering a business related major at the college level because most programs will require at least two courses in accounting, and students can get one done while they are at HCS. The college determined Karen Derr's impeccable background in accounting makes her as qualified to teach this course as any of the business instructors at the college.

There will be a decrease in disruptive behaviors in school and more learning can take place when children have developmentally appropriate routines set up at home for meals, sleep times and chores; when responsibility is expected and practiced; and respectful and courteous behaviors towards others are practiced and modeled at home.



We as teachers will continue to put all our time and energy into helping your child grow and learn at school while fostering respect and responsibility. We want to thank you so much for ALL that you do at home! We know it isn't easy especially when you are working late or exhausted during the holiday season. However, when you are firm and stick to your expecta-

tions, routines and responsibilities, it will pay off well in the long run for your child!!
