# A Message from the BOE

#### Is What It Is What It Is...

New York State is competing with other states for federal "Race to the Top" funding. President Obama intends to initiate additional federal programs to support education. Our state government collects most of its revenue from personal income tax and sales tax. Personal incomes are down. Sales are down. State revenues are down.

At HCS we must anticipate that, at best, new federal funding will replace lost state funding. Federal programs, by the nature of legislation, typically include complex restrictions which limit how the funding can be used. For instance, if federal funds were dedicated to STARTING something which we already do, we might not qualify for the federal money to do what state money previously supported. It also costs us time and money to thread the hoops. If government support (at best) remains flat and costs continue to rise, the balance of the burden will fall directly on our tax payers.

We are also at a disadvantage because our tax rate (dollars of tax per \$1000.00 of property value) is actually about half of the rate in many neighboring districts. To governments, we look like we could easily collect much more property tax than we do. WRONG. Much of our property value is in private homes and a house that might be worth \$50,000.00 in many parts of our county might be worth \$100,000.00 in many parts of our district. Furthermore, people don't pay their taxes out of the equity in their homes. People pay their taxes out of their incomes, which do not increase just because property values do.

What it all means to our school is this: we will not be able to do all that we would like to do; we will not be able to do all that we have been doing; we will have to make decisions.

Our mission must drive our decisions and shape our identity.

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THIS is what it is.

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### CAFETERIA WELCOMES 21st CENTURY

The recently installed touch screen "point of sale" system (cash register) in the cafeteria includes finger scan recognition technology, making it possible to identify students using a touchpad scanner. Before implementing this technology, our intent is to first inform parents and the community about its existence.

Finger scan recognition, one of the oldest methods of biometric identification, is a relatively new technology for school

foodservice. It has been successfully used in other security applications such as ATMs and computer networks; for membership management and access control to Disney World and SeaWorld; and for keyless entry to homes and cars.

Biometric technology is the use of automated touchpad scanning to recognize a person based on their finger image. The finger's ridges (lines across fingers) and valleys (spaces between ridges) are unique for each individual, making it one of the most popular tools for identification purposes. The scanner generates an image of the ridges and valleys, which is converted to a template consisting of minutiae points. This template is not a fingerprint and <u>cannot</u> be used to generate a fingerprint since there would be an infinite number of finger images that could possibly be generated from the same point.

Younger students have underdeveloped finger ridges and valleys making the use of this technology less effective for them. Students in grades 7-12 would be the first to use the scanner. One of the many challenges faced by this population is uninterrupted possession of their student identification card. This technology would eliminate the need for cards, a genuine source of frustration at lunch time.

Finger scanning will not be mandatory; parents will make the final decision about its use and will have an opportunity to opt out.

### Pre-Kindergarten Program: Jumpstart to Learning

Glenn Curtiss Elementary is enjoying its second year of hosting a prekindergarten program. The students enrolled continue to follow the New York State curriculum and we are seeing positive results with our current kindergarten student data.

Pre-kindergarten focuses on cognitive skills in language/literacy, mathematics, science and creative arts. The goal is to create opportunities for children to develop curiosity, persistence and reasoning skills through a variety of play activities. The social/emotional development and fine and gross motor development is also an important part of the program goals.

The first weeks of pre-k focus around getting to know each other and rules and procedures of the classroom. Other learning activities for math and science include left and right, food classification, measurement, patterning and hibernation/migration/adaptation. As the school year moves on, students learn the four seasons, simple machines and pulleys, health and safety, and the difference between day and night as well as nocturnal animals. As part of the English Language Arts curriculum, the students concentrate on parts of a story such as setting and character, order of a story, illustrator, author and how to care for a book. Much of the learning takes place through play activities, singing and rhyming. For more information please note there will be a pre-kindergarten information night on April 6, at 6pm in the high school auditorium.


If you have a child that will turn 4 years old prior to December 1, 2010, your child will be eligible for pre-kindergarten.

the #2 seed, Brandon Brock from South Seneca, 7-2 sending him into the finals against the #1 seed Jordan Schute from Keshequa. Josh went on to defeat Schute by a score of 7-2 and was crowned the 2010 Sectional Champion. In addition, the coaches selected Josh to receive the sportsmanship award for the tournament, and he was nominated for the most outstanding wrestler in the upper weights.

Josh's success at the sectional tournament falls on the heels of another milestone he achieved the weekend before when he recorded his 100th career win.

On February 13, Josh competed at RIT in the state qualifying tournament as the #4 seed. He beat his first two opponents (Bath and Keshequa) earning him a spot in the semifinals where he lost a tough match to a wrestler from Holley, the eventual tournament champion. From there he handled his opponent from Palmyra-Macedon moving him into the consolation finals where he defeated the number 2 seed from Byron Bergen giving Josh 3rd place in all of Section V Division 2 at 215 pounds. Josh missed qualifying as the alternate for the state tournament by 1 point.

Congratulations Josh on a great season and outstanding wrestling career at HCS!
