Updates from the K-6 Principal's Office

Integrated Science Class Enables Hands-On Learning



Jesse Hamilton and Justin Lawrence conduct an experiment to test the strength of a pencil during their Integrated Science class. The strongest pencil held over 11 kilograms of mass! Integrated Science was created to allow students an opportunity to meet the third science credit outside the standard Regents courses. It is a course where lab is integrated into the daily coursework and where the emphasis is on assessments based on student products rather than on written tests.

Throughout the year, students investigate different topics by applying the scientific method. During the first quarter, students learn how to use the scientific method to evaluate different products. For the end of quarter evaluation, the class is divided into teams and each team picks a product for which they will evaluate its overall performance. Each team member is required to design an experiment to test a particular trait of the product, carry out the experiment and then evaluate how the product performed on the test. One team, comprised of Justin Lawrence, Jesse Hamilton, Jacob Withey and Matt Bailey, chose to compare the performance of 4 brands of pencils. Traits they chose to evaluate included how well the leads held up under use, which brand contained the most mount of lead, eraser performance and pencil strength. Interestingly, the strongest pencil held over 11 kilograms of mass before it broke.

Other consumer analysis projects evaluated the taste and grams of filling and frosting in breakfast tarts and the taste, nutritional value and time it takes to get to the center of filled lollipops. That sounds like my kind of science class!

Interesting Statistics from the Transportation Department



Thank you to all parents who have their children ready and at their stops on time. We have had a very good start to the year and appreciate your cooperation. It's getting darker in the mornings now so please speak to your child about staying back away from the road when waiting for the bus to arrive and watching the driver for crossing instructions. I'd like to share some interesting statistics from Washington relating to school buses: There are 480,000 school buses currently in operation. When students ride the bus rather than private vehicles more than 2.3 billion gallons of fuel are spared each year, resulting in a net savings of more than \$8 billion dollars in fuel costs. Plus, your child is on the safest (13 times safer), most economi-



cal and environmentally-friendly way to get to school. Other interesting school bus facts are listed below:

- *17.3 million: Total number of private vehicles needed to transport students currently riding on all school buses.
- *822 million gallons per year: Total fuel used by school bus fleet.
- *\$3.4 billion per year: Total cost of fuel used by the U.S. school bus fleets.
- *\$131 per year: Cost of fuel per child transported by school bus.



- *3.1 billion gallons per vear: Total fuel for cars replaced by buses.
- *\$11.4 billion per year: Cost of fuel for cars replaced by school buses.
- *62.4 billion: Total annual car mileage saved by students riding school buses.
- *346.6 million: Total daily car mileage saved by students riding school buses.
- *36: Average number of cars needed to transport students currently riding one school bus.

In Addition....

There are a few roads in our district that our Board of Education has declared not suitable for our school buses to travel. Most of the roads are one lane dirt roads or up/down very steep inclines that would put a school bus loaded with children in a very dangerous situation in inclement weather. The roads so named are: Vogt, Cider Hill, Snell, Beers Hill, Crows Nest (from the Southern end by Vogt), Brewer, Stephanie Taylor Drive, Wixon Hill, Stone Schoolhouse, Urbana Gully, Lower Silvernail Hill, Gibson Hill (off Gallagher), any lower East Lake roads, upper Silsbee (the end near Day Rd.). 
HCS Journalists Attend Communications Day

On Friday, October 17, members of the Grape Press, the high school newspaper, attended the annual Communications Day held at St. Bonaventure University. High school students from the Buffalo region to the Southern Tier were in attendance. Communications Day was started in 1936 to introduce high school students interested in careers in journalism or related media to professionals in the job market, as well as students who major in communications at the university. The trip, organized by Grape Press Advisor Diana Satterfield, provided students with the opportunity to not only attend a variety of workshops regarding the communications field, but also tour the campus. The keynote speaker was Patricia Kennealy Morrison, a graduate of St. Bonaventure, former editor of Jazz and Pop Magazine, author and widow of musician Jim Morrison.

Speakers stressed the importance of writing skills at the college level and as a necessary component for the job market. It was noted that one third of high school students who attend college are not prepared and are being sent to either community colleges or remediation on campuses, extending their years in college, thus costing parents and taxpayers millions of dollars. Safety: Always assists in keeping the environment safe



Champions Laker Leaders Announced



Banana Splits is a peer support group for children whose families are in transition as a result of separation, divorce, remarriage

or death. The major goal is to help children regain a feeling of stability by confronting the crisis of divorce or remarriage and learning to live with it. Through peer support of other students who also share feelings of loss and change, the children try to help each other solve the problems present in many "splits."

Through drawings, specialized projects, discussions, humor and books, children are helped to face hurts and change what they can in order to return to the full time job of being a child.

This year, first through sixth grade students will meet in grade level groups every week at lunchtime, beginning in December. Specific meeting dates will be sent home once children are signed up. The sessions are approximately thirty to fortyfive minutes long with students eating lunch and then moving into projects. Groups can range in size from four students up to a maximum of ten. Attendance is on a voluntary basis.
