## **Curtiss School Update**

At the February Board of Education meeting, the Board approved the contract of sale for the Curtiss School building and property to Long Rock LLC out of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania. The owner of Long Rock LLC, Mr. Robert Lack, along with the District are working through the closing process in hopes to finalize the sale in early July. The final purchase price for the building and property was \$302,000.

As a reminder, due to changes in State law regarding the sale of school buildings that was passed in 2011, the proceeds from the sale of the property will not financially benefit the District in any way. Currently the State is still paying Hammondsport revenue labeled Building Aid for work done on that campus during the 2000 and 2004 Capital Projects. As soon as the sale is finalized, the District will need to report the sale and final purchase price to New York State. They will subtract the purchase price from the amount of Building Aid remaining to be paid to Hammondsport for previous work done at the Curtiss School. The District will then need to put the proceeds from the sale in a reserve fund and draw on that reserve over the next few years to replace what we will be losing in Building Aid. This will result in making the sale of the property revenue neutral with the proceeds only going to replace the loss of Building Aid from the State. The District still has debt outstanding for work on the Curtiss School that will not be paid off until 2038.

Despite the financial issues involved, I am very pleased that we have found a buyer for the property and hope that any future use will be in line with what the community would like to see. The Curtiss School is a beautiful facility and an asset to the community of Hammondsport. (include picture of Curtiss School)

## 3 From the Desk of H.S. Principal Tad Rounds

During the month of April, all schools in New York State will be assessing the CCLS (Common Core Learning Standards) in ELA (English Language Arts) and math in grades 3-8. These exams are more rigorous compared to exams in the past, and require students to apply concepts and justify responses to demonstrate competence with the curriculum. This is a good thing! According to initial guidance from SED (State Education Department): "At first, the new tests may seem more difficult. This is normal. The new tests will be based on the "shifts" in the standards. Over time, students and teachers will adjust to the clear expectations. There also is a possibility that student test scores could drop in the first or second year of the new tests." The exams are three days and the testing dates for ELA (English Language Arts) are April 16<sup>th</sup> through April 18<sup>th</sup>. The math exams will be administered from April 24<sup>th</sup> through April 26<sup>th</sup>. These dates are set by the SED (State Education Department) and it is important that students are well rested and present in school on these days. During April the junior class will host their prom at the Corning Country Club on the 27th. Also, a workshop for all students is scheduled on April 30th entitled: "Act with Respect Always" by Coach Rich Johns, a nationally acclaimed speaker. This will be followed by the National Honor Society Inductions on May 3rd. AP (Advanced Placement) exams and Regents exams are right around the corner. As always, teachers are available from 2:20-3:20 for extra assistance. Please check the Parent Portal for current information on your child's progress.

✦ ting	When driving in neighborhoods with school zones, watch out for young people who may be thinking about getting to school, but may not be thinking of get- there safely.	
+	Slow down. Watch for children walking in the street, especially if there are no sidewalks in neighborhood.	
+	Slow down. Watch for children playing and congregating near bus stops.	
+	Be alert. Children arriving late for the bus may dart into the street without looking for traffic.	
+	Learn and obey the school bus laws in your state. Learn the "flashing signal light system" that school bus drivers use to alert motorists of pending actions:	
•	Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicles.	
<i>Red flashing lights</i> and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off. Motorists must stop their cars and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again. <b>Children</b>		
+	Get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.	
+	When the bus approaches, stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb, and line up away from the street.	
+	Wait until the bus stops, the door opens, and the driver says that it's okay before stepping onto the bus.	
✦ bus	If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the sidewalk or along the side of the road to a point at least five giant steps (10 feet) ahead of the before you cross. Be sure that the bus driver can see you, and you can see the bus driver.	
+ or de	Use the handrails to avoids falls. When exiting the bus, be careful that clothing with drawstrings, and book bags with straps don't get caught in the handrails oors.



## Parent's Backpack Guide to Common Core State Standards

In 2011 New York adopted the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) to make sure that all children succeed once they graduate from high school. This guide is designed to help you understand how the standards will affect your child, what changes you will see and what you can do at home to help your children the classroom.

#### Why Are the Common Core State Standards Important?

The Common Core State Standards are important because they will help all children – no matter who they are – learn the same skills. They create clear expectations for what your child should know and be able to do in key areas: **reading**, **writing**, **speaking** and **listening**, **language** and **mathematics**. If you know what these expectations are, then you can work with the teacher and help your child prepare.

### **ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS (ELA)**

The new Common Core State Standards make several important changes to current standards. These changes are called shifts. The chart below shows what these shifts change, what you might see in your child's backpack and what you can do to help your child. If your child's assignments do not reflect the shifts, then talk to your

What's Shifting?	What to Look for in the Backpack?	What Can You Do?
• Your child will now <u>read</u> <u>more non-fiction</u> in each grade level.	<ul> <li>Look for your kids to have more reading assignments based on real-life events, such as biographies, articles and historical stories.</li> </ul>	• Read non-fiction books with your children. Find ways to make reading fun and exciting.
<ul> <li>Reading more non-fiction texts will help your child <u>learn about the world</u> <u>through reading</u>.</li> </ul>	• Look for your kids to bring home more fact-based books about the world. For instance, your 1st Grader or Kindergartener might read Clyde Robert Bulla's <i>A Tree is a Plant</i> . This book lets students read and learn about science.	• Know what non-fiction books are grade-level appropriate and make sure your children have access to such books.
• Your child will <u>read</u> <u>challenging texts very</u> <u>closely</u> , so they can make sense of what they read and draw their own conclusions.	• Your kids will have reading and writing assignments that might ask them to retell or write about key parts of a story or book. For example, your 2nd or 3rd Grader might be asked to read aloud Faith D'Aluisio's non-fiction book titled <i>What the World Eats</i> and retell facts from the story.	• Provide more challenging texts for your kids to read. Show them how to dig deeper into difficult pieces.
<ul> <li>When it comes to writing or retelling a story, your child will <u>use "evidence" gath- ered from the text to</u> <u>support what they say.</u></li> </ul>	• Look for written assignments that ask your child to draw on concrete examples from the text that serve as evidence. Evidence means examples from the book that your child will use to support a response or conclusion. This is different from the opinion questions that have been used in the past.	<ul> <li>Ask your child to provide evidence in everyday discussions and disagreements.</li> </ul>
• Your child will <u>learn how to</u> write from what they read.	• Look for writing assignments that ask your child to make arguments in writing using evidence. For 4th and 5th graders, this might mean reading and writing about <i>The Kids Guide to Money</i> , a non-fictional book by Steve Otfinoski.	• Encourage writing at home. Write together using evidence and details.
<ul> <li>Your child will <u>have an</u> <u>increased academic</u> <u>vocabulary</u>.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Look for assignments that stretch your child's vocabulary and teach them that "language is power."</li> </ul>	Read often to babies, toddlers, preschoolers and children.
