Congratulations to the Class of 2016 on their impending graduation from Hammondsport Junior/Senior High. Individually and collectively this class has extensive accomplishments both academically and in extracurricular pursuits. Members have been selected to Area All State and All County for both band and chorus. In addition, both sectional and county championships have been secured by student athletes in the class. Most importantly, the students have contributed to a positive school climate with their work in Student Council and on the Student Leadership Team. ## Students Take Part in History Reenactment

On Friday, May 13, 2016 the second graders had the privilege of having the "Bedford Light Artillery" set up a Civil War camp reenactment.
This goes along with the $2^{\text {nd }}$ grade Listening \& Learning Unit on the Civil War. Students were very excited about the field trip.

During the visit students got to sample a "ration" of food soldiers got in a day. The students enjoyed hard tack, jerky from the $18^{\text {th }}$ century as well as the $21^{\text {st }}$ century, and apples. For lunch students also had a sample of corn bread or biscuits and beef stew that was made over a fire.

Kids also learned about muskets and cannons. At the end of the day the children were split up into different sides

## Literacy Night in P-6th

Mr. Stermole and Miss Johnston organized a literacy night for elementary students. There were games and activities for students and parents to partake in, and members of high school
student council were there to help out.
In the game pictured below, students played Long and Short Vowel Basketball which required them to read a word on the basketball, determine if it is a short or long vowel word, and then tries to throw the ball in the correct basket. They won a point for each basket they made.
In the game pictured at
 the bottom left, students and parents played a game based on Tiddly Winks, but was a reading comprehension game where players read a
 text and then flipped the playing chips into a portion of the dish. Players then had to answer the comprehension question that was in that portion of the dish. The game was played so that players had to get either three adjacent questions correct to win or get more spaces than their opponent.

## Vaccination update

Effective September 1, 2016, students entering grades seven and twelve in New York State schools will be required to be fully vaccinated against meningococcal disease, according to the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). The ACIP recommends that all adolescents receive a first does of MenACWY vaccine at 11-12 years of age and a booster dose at age 16 years in order to boost their immunity during the years at which the are at greatest risk oc meningococcal disease. If the first dose was administered on or after the sixteenth birthday, a booster dose is not necessary.

## Students Aittend Clemens Center Performance

On the evening of May 17, 2016, 38 students and two chaperones, Dr. Satterfield and Mr. Jackson, attended a dynamic performance of the Blue Man Group at the Clemens Center in Elmira, NY. The experience was rewarding for many of the students, some of whom, had never traveled to Elmira. ## District and Transportation News

News from the transportation department Questions to ask Our Student Who Ride the

## Bus

1. What are the 4 steps to crossing safely? (1. Walk forward until you can see the drivers face; $\mathbf{2}$.Wait for the driver's signal; 3. Walk only as far as the outer edge of the bus and look both ways; 4. Cross only if there are no cars in sight.)
2. How far should in front of the bus should you walk before looking for the driver's signal? (Ten giant steps; until you can see the drivers face.)
3. Why couldn't the bus driver see you if you crossed close to the front of the bus? (You are hidden by the bus.)
4. What is a blind spot? (A place where the drivers can't see you.)
5. Where are the blind spots on a school bus? (Everyplace within the danger zone.)
6. What can you do to avoid being hidden from the driver's vision? (Walk far enough in front of the bus; stay out of danger zones.)
7. Do cars always stop when they see flashing red lights? (No. Sometimes drivers disobey the laws, are careless, or don't see the bus's flashing lights.)
