# Ciming Figh News from Hammondsport Central School District Superintendent Kyle Bower 

Every once in a while, you become aware of events that remind you why you chose the path in life that you did. In the midst of everyone's daily grind, it can be difficult to look back and remember the initial pattern of decisions that makes up one's present situation. It seems the longer you do something, the more the tendency to focus on difficulties, change, and the frustration that things aren't 'like they used to be'. Some events in the last few weeks have reminded me why education is such a challenging business, but also why I would never want to do anything else.
Here at HCS we have a student named Kyle Orr. I have known Kyle since he started Kindergarten. I have had the privilege of meeting his grandmother and father over the years and whenever called upon, they have been there for both Kyle and the school. Every morning, rain or shine, you can find Kyle at the back door entrance to the Main Street School. If the weather is bad, he may wait just inside the door, but as soon as anyone reaches for the handle, he opens it wide and greets that person with a heart-felt "good morning". If it's a Friday, he may share his weekend plans or he may ask you what you've got going on. Whether it is a teacher with an armload of books and bags, or a young student simply carrying a backpack, he is there with a smile. Kyle's daily routine could be viewed as no more than common courtesy by others who may see it on an infrequent basis. However, knowing Kyle, it is much more than that. He is a young man that wants to be helpful and sees being helpful as a responsibility he enjoys and he expects nothing in return. Kyle doesn't hold the door because it's an assignment in a class, he does it because someone has taught him courtesy and respect along the way. Kyle is the kind of role model we sometimes look past in the midst of a busy morning, and that's really too bad. Not anymore.
On Saturday, November $3^{\text {rd }}$ the Hammondsport Laker Volleyball Team won the Section V Class D Championship by defeating Prattsburgh at Avoca Central School. After a lengthy volley, a Prattsburgh player sent the ball back over the net and the official called the ball out of the back line. The missed call was clear to the fans sitting in the bleachers but the head official accepted the call of the line judge. Even though the score was very close, and this was the championship game, our head coach Julie Amsden informed the head official that the call was wrong and Prattsburgh should be awarded the point and the serve. I thank Julie for not only leading our team to the championship, but for showing our athletes and our fans that there is a right way to do it, no matter what. As we make our way through the holiday season, I hope everyone takes the time to look at what is good around us. In the coming year as a District we will struggle with a budget and we will make difficult decisions. We are prepared and we will work through it together. 1. Purchase for use in student transportation two seventy (70) passenger school buses and one (1) eight passenger van for a total amount not to exceed \$214,648.
2. Expend the maximum amount from the 1997 Bus Purchase Reserve and close that reserve. That reserve 'has a current balance of approximately $\$ 50,648$.
3. Expend an amount not to exceed $\$ 164,000$ from the voter approved 2012 Capital Reserve for

Transportation.
This purchase will be completely paid for through District reserves which were voter approved solely for this purpose and will have no impact on the tax levy.

Congratulations to the Hammondsport Junior/ Senior High staff for the school's recognition as a Reward School by the NYSED (New York State Education Department). Hammondsport was one of 250 schools in the state recognized for as High Performing school based upon student achievement on Regents assessments and graduation rates. Special recognition goes to the Girls Volleyball Team on their Sectional Title. The girls had a tremendous season and all fall athletes should be proud of the sportsmanship that they exercised during the season.

In the area of academics, all students in grades 7 and $8^{\text {th }}$ have taken a computerized assessment in mathematics and ELA (English Language Arts) known as the NWEAs (Northwest Evaluation Assessments). These assessments provide diagnostic information on students' strengths and weaknesses and compares progress against a national norm. Teachers will now be able have an accurate picture of the reading and mathematical aptitude of their students and monitor progress against a national norm.
A special thank you to the community, Hammondsport Fire Department, Student Council and PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) for their participation in the Annual Hammondsport Community Basketball Game. Both the Hammondsport Community Fund and the local food pantry benefited from the generous donations of community members.

The adoption of the Common Core Learning Standards has increased the academic rigor of the ELA (English Language Arts) and math curriculum. 2013 is the first year that the new standards will be assessed. The following is an example problem from the 8th Grade Math Assessment:

A trainer for a professional football team keeps track of the amount of water players consume throughout practice. The trainer observes that the amount of water consumed is a linear function of the temperature on a given day. The trainer finds that when it is 90 F the players consume about 220 gallons of water, and when it is 76 F the players consume about 178 gallons of water.

Write a linear function to model the relationship between the gallons of water consumed and the temperature.
Explain the meaning of the slope in the context of the problem.
The increased level of rigor is a great thing for students and will require support and teamwork from all stakeholders to ensure their continued success.

[^1]:    On Saturday, November 3, the Hammondsport Varsity Volleyball team claimed the Section $V$ Class D title after defeating Prattsburgh by a score of $3-0$. This was the third sectional title in the history of the program (2008, 1987).

    As the number one seed going into the sectional tournament, the Lakers cruised through the quarterfinal and semifinal matches against CG Finney and Lyndonville never dropping a set. The semifinal win set up a \#1 versus \#2 seed match-up with Prattsburgh. Though the Lakers had beaten Prattsburgh during the regular season, the Vikings were one of only two teams to win a set against the Laker starting line-up this season.
    "Prattsburgh always plays us tough and we expected them to come out swinging in the championship match," said Coach Julie Amsden.
    The Lakers kicked off the match with an early 7-0 lead behind the serving of sophomore defensive specialist Aly Binnert, but the Vikings quickly rallied back to bring the score within one point. After a series of point exchanges, the girls finally closed out the first set by a score of 25-19. In the second set, the girls dug themselves an early 6-0 hole until the offensive attack of Lori Gordon, Carly Presley and Taylin Bower came to life to tie up the set at 10-10. The lead changed several times in the second set, but the Lakers once again came out on top by a score of 25-19. With a 2-0 lead going into the third set, the girls played with renewed confidence. They carved out an early lead and never looked back, cruising to 25-12 third
