It is my pleasure to congratulate our Valedictorian for the Class of 2016, Helena Carvajal and our Salutatorian, Gregory DiTomasso. Both Gregory and Helena have consistently strived to challenge themselves by availing themselves of both AP (Advanced Placement) and ACE classes, while excelling in their extracurricular pursuits. Additional congratulations go out to Jordon Thompson who was recognized as Student of the Month at GST BOCES in Coopers Plains, and won the Vanguard Award for his academic achievement in his career program.

Spring sports have commenced with programs being run in conjunction with Prattsburgh for all sports and levels, with the exception of varsity baseball. Over 132 Hammondsport student athletes in grades 7 -12 signed up for teams along with 42 Prattsburgh student athletes. The addition of the Prattsburgh athletes allowed us to field three levels of softball, and increased practice locations to utilize during inclement weather. Shuttle buses run from both schools for the two practice slots; Hammondsport's sports runs depart at 3:15 and 5:15, respectively, for any athlete in need.

Grades 3-8 English Language Arts and Math testing will commence the first two weeks in April. The SED (State Education Department) has amended the rules and regulations related to both the format and use of these exams. Specifically, all tests have been shortened, including both the number of reading passages and questions for ELA, and the number of multiple choice and constructed responses for math. Time limits have also been removed for all exams based upon parental and educator feedback, and a moratorium has been placed on the use of 3-8 ELA and Math tests in teacher evaluations. As always, the best preparation for your child directly preceding the exams is adequate rest and nutrition as well as encouraging your child to do their best. They have been well prepared to be successful. Happy Spring!


GET INVOLVED


Math-CON began in 2008 with only 125 students, and it has grown every year since with over 330 schools in 42 states



Transportation News

Messages to the kids:

- 1. Never cross close to the front of the bus make sure the driver can see you.
- 2. Never pick up anything you drop close to or under the bus ask the driver what to do.
- 3. Never run after a bus or bang on the side.
- 4. If you must cross the street in front of the bus, follow the driver's directions, and stop and look before you cross.
- 5. Never run across a street, it's better to miss the bus than rush and risk being hit by a car.
- 6. Stay away from the rear and sides of the bus always be in a safe place where the driver can see you.

Messages to the motoring public

- 1. Never pass a school bus when its stop lights are flashing.
- 2. Be extra vigilant around school hours assume a child might run out at any moment
- 3. Be courteous to school buses, give them room and let them change lanes when they need to.

Safety = Freedom from risk. Risk can come from unsafe conditions, but it's usually caused by <u>unsafe behaviors</u>. Almost every accident is caused by a driver's unsafe behavior. Drivers should know and avoid the risky behaviors.

The most important are:

- 1. Count the kids away, know where they are before you move the wheels.
- 2. Always rock and roll for left hand turns.
- 3. Stay back four seconds maintain a safe following distance and leave yourself an out.
- 4. Look ahead and be prepared.
- 5. Look around, always know what is going on around you.
- 6. Always check for sleeping children.
- 7. Never drop off a child at an unauthorized stop.
- 8. If late, stay late.

Each March, the bright colors and eclectic designs of student artwork transform businesses and organizations throughout Chemung, Schuyler, Steuben and the edge of Tioga counties into exhibit spaces.
