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News from *Mr. Kyle Bower, Superintendent*

With January brings the difficult work of finalizing budget development as we look to a successful finish to the 15-16 year at the same time that we finalize planning for 16-17. This budget season will be our most difficult in many years due to the multiple factors that are against us. Although the Governor has touted the significant increase in school aid that he has proposed, for Hammondsport his proposal represents a projected \$62,000 additional dollars as we attempt to balance a \$13.5 million dollar budget. Due to rising costs within our health insurance plan, we have been given notice of an immediate 10% increase in the 15-16 school year rates and the implementation of an additional 15% increase in all premiums effective July 1 for the 16-17 school year. That increase alone will represent an approximate need to find an additional \$400,000 to cover only the increase in health insurance costs.

Raising property taxes is always the last option and the tax levy discussion is always the last component of budget development. With the statewide property tax cap set at .12%, there is no doubt we will be looking to override the cap in our upcoming budget vote. Our local property tax cap will be calculated in the coming weeks and that information will be shared in the coming edition of Laker Lines. I encourage participation in the development of the 16-17 school budget either through attendance at our Board meetings and workshops, joining the District Budget and Program Advisory Committee, or contacting me directly with your thoughts and ideas.

Springtime also brings New York State testing for our students in grades 3-8 in math and English Language Arts. In February I will be presenting our District testing plan to the Board of Education. That plan will reflect any changes that have recently been made by the Board of Regents. It is still required that all students be offered State tests and the District is still responsible to maintain a pattern of at least 95% of our students being tested. However, we will have an opt out plan in place and parents will be informed of how they can exercise their right to opt their children out of testing well before the testing dates.

Thank you to the Hammondsport PTO and President Kim Sprague for their donation of a new sound system to the High School Gym!

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
Winter Greetings!

From the desk of Tad Rounds, 7-12 Principal

Two instructional focal points of the Junior/Senior High School for the 2015/2016 school year are technology integration and student engagement. Both elements are interrelated and support the mission of the district to prepare students for an ever-changing, global society.

Faculty and staff were surveyed at the midpoint of this school year regarding the efficacy of the one-to-one technology program initiated in September for all students in grades 7-12. Based upon the results of the survey:

87% of those surveyed believe the Google Chromebooks are reliable for student use,
70% of those surveyed believe that the Google Chromebooks enhance their ability to present information in a compelling format,
and

95% of those surveyed believe the Google Chromebooks enhance students' ability to collaborate with the course content.

Likewise, collaboration is a key strategy to foster student engagement, which is again an instructional focus of the Junior/Senior High School. Research by Eric Jensen shows that student engagement is related to four key domains:

Effort: A willingness to do what it takes to be successful.

Attitude: Positive belief in one's own abilities

Behavior: Kindness, fairness, and cooperation

Cognitive Capacity: Vocabulary and

Executive Function (i.e. self discipline to complete tasks)

Although this should be no surprise, all four of these engagement domains are directly correlated with post-secondary success in both college and the work place.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Christian Torp, HCS Class of 1998, is a civil rights attorney in Lexington, KY. He also graduated from Cornell University and the University of Kentucky Law School.

Torp works with clients whose civil rights have been violated. His biggest case to date has been working with Kentuckians For The Commonwealth in their quest to allow felons who have served their terms to receive their right to vote. Kentucky was only one of four states that did not allow this. Gov. Beshear signed into law in December this new bill which will give 100,000



Kentuckians who have no pending charges nor were sentenced for a sexual or treasonous offense the right to vote.

In his spare time, he and his wife, Tanya, raise chickens, rabbits and bees while working on communal gardens.

The School Wide Spelling Bee is Coming!









2016 HCS Summer Enrichment Program

The Summer Enrichment Program is an initiative to engage Hammondsport students in non-traditional and creative ways. These opportunities will be of little, or no cost, to students of the Hammondsport School District. Most of these opportunities will take place outside of the classroom or off campus. While the majority of these ventures will be offered during the months of July and August, our kick-off event is an opportunity to see the world-famous Blue Man Group at the Clemens Center in Elmira on the evening of May 17. Increased access to the arts and theater is just one focus of this initiative.

The planning for the Summer Enrichment calendar is underway. We hope to offer opportunities to students K-12 that promote principles of STEM, physical education/athletics, and the arts. All events not only align to, but enhance, NYS Learning Standards. A brochure is in development and will include hikes/tours of three NYS Parks, local history and trails, local cooperative farms, and culinary adventures to include a trip to the Food Truck Rodeo in Rochester. Opportunities are also being arranged to enjoy golf lessons and yoga. Additionally, trips will include the Rockwell Museum, CMOG, the Seneca Park Zoo, the National Women's Historical Park, and the Genesee Country Museum, just to name a few.

The first duet, "Necessary Evil" by Mike Phelan, is a mythological "What if?" that suggests mankind's deck of cards was stacked against us, before we even had a

chance to set events into motion for ourselves, when one angel believes the "earth project" is a fiasco, defies the laws of physics, and cannot be done. It starred Natalie Lowin (9th grades) as Lucy, the rebellious angel, and newcomer Thomas Kressly (7th grade) as Michael, the good angel.
