From the Desk of Mr. Bower, Superintendent of Schools

As I write this article one week before Thanksgiving I am reminded of how much I have to be thankful for. Although the last year has presented many, many challenges to those in education, I am thankful to be facing these challenges in such a supportive school community.

As the economic realities of this pandemic continue to unfold, the Hammondsport school community is going to face even greater challenges together. Governor Coumo continues to tell school districts to prepare for up to a 20% reduction in State Aid in the current year, with reductions continuing into the next several fiscal years. So the community is aware, if our District has State Aid funding reduced by 20% we would have three options to consider: reduce expenses by eliminating programs and positions, increase revenue by increasing our local tax levy by the reduced State Aid amount, or a combination of both approaches. A reduction of 20% in State Aid in the current year represents approximately \$990,000 in lost revenue. That amount is significant and will require tough decisions that will impact students, staff and tax payers.

Unfortunately, the model our Governor uses to inform schools of his decisions is to simply announce through a press conference with no prior notification to Superintendents or Board of Education members. Based on that understanding, the Board and I are preparing now for difficult decisions we may need to make later. As a part of this process I continue to want to hear from the school community on what is most important. I will be holding my monthly Virtual Town Hall meeting for interested community members on Thursday, December 10th at 6pm. The focus of this meeting will be discussions of where we are in the budget development process for the coming school year and listening to our communities priorities at this point in time. I hope everything continues to move forward in a positive way until that time! I hope everyone has a healthy and happy holiday season!

Federal Laws Regarding Online Data Privacy and Security

As schools work to deal with the many issues related to remote instruction and working with students online, the District would like to highlight some protections that are in place that parents should be aware of.

COPPA- Children's Online Privacy Protection Act

The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), gives parents control over the information collected from young children online. COPPA ensures that children under 13 years of age DO NOT share personal information on the internet without the express approval of their parents.

Reality Check: It should be noted that social media sites like Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and Snapchat require users to be at least 13 years of age to create accounts in order to stay compliant with COPPA. Remembering Our Military at Christmas



From the Desk of Mr. Rounds, 7-12 Principal

Our first quarter of the 2020/2021 school year is complete! The faculty and staff at Hammondsport Junior/Senior High want to thank our students and families for everything they have done to maintain a safe and operational school environment. We have had minimal disruptions to our system because of the care and caution of our students and families. Our established four day in-person, one day remote instructional model with socially distanced classroom allows us to serve fully remote students, students in the hybrid model and students who are temporarily required to quarantine based upon Department of Health requirements. At the conclusion of our first 10 weeks of school, our system translated into **thirty-six days** of direct in-person instruction. The more common hybrid model, employed in other districts, typically consists of two days of in-person instruction and three days of remote instruction. Based upon the same time frame this model would equate to **eighteen days** of instruction. Our system has doubled the in-person contact time for our students, and the responsible behavior of our students and parents has allowed us to run this system with minimal disruptions.

Hammondsport Junior/Senior High is committed to providing safe opportunities to our students to engage in extracurricular activities. As fall athletes and parents know, traditional activities may not always be permitted or they may look significantly different than during normal times. As of today, the New York State Public High School Athletic Association has only authorized low and moderate risk winter sports (bowling, gymnastics, indoor track, skiing, and swimming). In the absence of our traditional winter sports, the faculty and staff are crafting intramural activities that comply with New York



State Public Health guidelines. Physical and social activities are a vital component of a high school experience, and I applaud our staff for making opportunities available in a safe fashion.

During Halloween week our Student Council hosted its annual costume competition with categories for funniest, most original, and best group.







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Traditionally our seniors would depart for their Senior Trip on Columbus Day Weekend. With COVID restriction on travel and group activities limited, the trip was postponed until the spring. However, our senior advisors Mrs. Katona, Mrs. Ullrich and our Senior Activities Coordinator Mr. Conley organized a Senior Picnic with food and outdoor activities to allow our seniors to bond as a class. We have a great group of seniors who have acted as leaders and role models for our student body during this time.



With social distancing requirements in place,

traditional parent teacher conferences will be held via Zoom and phone for the current time period. Grade level teachers have met and contacted parents and guardians for necessary meetings to be held in the afternoon of November 23rd and November 24th. Because of the restrictions in place, we are reserving Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 2:30p.m.-3:20p.m. for the remainder of the semester for any necessary or requested conferences. 
Fourth Grade Beginner Band Assembly

Event + Response = Outcome. Prior to the start of the school year and as we have progressed throughout the first marking period, this is an equation our staff has reflected on together. The COVID-19 pandemic is an event that all schools and communities have been faced with and are working through and certainly is an event no one chose to take on. While we cannot control the onset of this pandemic, we remind ourselves that we can choose our response to it. It is easy to take the mindset of "we've always done it this way, and now it isn't possible." Some might call this a fixed mindset. I am so proud of the way our entire school community has instead modeled the exact growth mindset we teach our students, as instead we've collectively said, "why not do it this way instead?"

In taking this approach responding to the pandemic, we've been able to impact the outcome for our students. We've held onto many of the important traditions within our school. When we could not hold our traditional Halloween parade for our community, we instead held a safe and socially distanced trick-or-treat trail for our students made possible by donations from our staff, provided individually packaged cookies and juice thanks to our PTO and cafeteria, and provided mini-pumpkins for all students to decorate and take home thanks to a donation from a community member. This is one example of the countless ways we've creatively problem-solved to "do things differently" to continue to provide these experiences for our children.

Another "event" brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic was the need to socially distance our classrooms and cohort students to minimize the amount of contact across grade levels and individual classrooms. As a result, many of the best instructional practices our teachers use were no longer possible. *Again, our teachers and staff have chosen to respond for our kids*. While the instructional practices seen in our classrooms may look different in many ways for now, the rigor, instructional excellence, and positive learning environment you can trust and expect within a Hammondsport education no doubt remain.

The one reality that continues to be a challenge for us is the limitations we are faced with that prevent us from having our families in the building as we navigate the 2020-2021 school year together. As such, we are working to pack as many pictures of the learning experiences our children are engaged in into this issue of Laker Lines to provide our families with a window into the learning taking place daily.

We are excited for our upcoming parent teacher conferences on November 23rd and 24th. As with other events, these too will have to look different - they will occur via phone or Zoom only. However, we'll continue to control our response in Hammondsport as we communicate and work together as always with the common goal of providing the best **outcomes** possible for our children, regardless of the circumstances we are faced with. I wish all of our families a safe and healthy upcoming holiday season – we all have much to be thankful for!



Paxton and Giuseppe practice their number identification skills through play as they build pepperoni pizzas in Kindergarten math!




Wyatt and Cheyenne growing their early literacy skills in readers and writers workshop!
