A Message from the Superintendent, Mr. Bower

On September 6, 2016, Governor Andrew Cuomo signed a new law that requires public schools in New York to test for lead in all water outlets currently or potentially used for drinking or cooking. This letter is to inform you of the results of the testing that have just been received by the District, and the remediation efforts that will be implemented immediately.

Current law establishes an action level of fifteen micrograms of lead per liter, typically referred to as "parts per billion (ppb)." If a sample from a water outlet exceeds this level, schools must take steps to prevent the use of the outlet for drinking or cooking purposes until it is remediated, and follow up testing confirms it is no longer above the action level.

Of the one hundred ten water outlets sampled in recent testing this fall, twenty eight outlets had water samples with readings slightly above the state action level. All of the new elevated readings were found in sinks throughout the building, both in restrooms and classrooms. Immediate remediation involves turning off the cold water to the impacted sinks and placing signage that directs the water to be used for handwashing/cleaning only. The current sink fixtures will be replaced as soon as possible, and the water will be retested. In spring testing, the District did find two classroom water fountains and one hallway water fountain which did have samples test slightly above the action level. All three locations have been turned off. Remediation in those three areas is ongoing.

The health and safety of our students, staff, and visitors remains our number one priority. A complete remediation plan along with detailed water testing results have been posted to our District website. As new tests are conducted and the results are received, they will be posted on the website as well. On the website we have also posted informational resources such as a frequently asked questions document along with details on the new State water testing law. As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index or 'BMI'. The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report. The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier. If you do not wish to have your child's weight status group information included as part of the Health Department's survey this year, please print and sign your name below and return this form to:

New Leveled Literary Intervention System

This year our district officially began the Fountas & Pinnell Leveled Literacy Intervention System (LLI) to assist atrisk students. This is an intervention program which provides daily, intensive one-on-one, or small group instruction in addition to regular ELA and academic intervention services.

The goal of LLI is to raise literacy achievement of students who are not achieving grade level reading expectations using leveled books and fast-paced lessons. Multiple types of data are used to identify our at-risk students including, but not limited to, NWEA, Fountas & Pinnell benchmarks, NYS ELA results, and teacher recommendations based on classroom performance. NWEA assessment is done three times per year, and Fountas & Pinnell benchmarking is done three or four times a year depending on child's grade level.

Just because your child begins the year in the LLI program, doesn't mean they will remain there. Once students are on-level, they will be discontinued in the program. Some students may even test in to the program as the year goes on. Again, to identify on-level, we use multiple types of data.

All students who receive this service will have report card documentation provided with each quarterly report card. Should you have any questions, please contact your child's LLI provider—Mrs. Snyder, K-1; Mr. Stermole, 2,3,5; Mrs. K. Jensen, 4,6,7-9.
