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Happy Holidays to all from the Hammondsport Junior/ Senior High Staff. Winter brings a number of great opportunities and events for the student body. Winter athletics are in full swing, the Ski Club will be trekking to Bristol Resort to enjoy the slopes and our band, chorus, and show choir students will showcase their talents at the Holiday Concerts.

The Poverty Action Committee has met and provided preliminary recommendations to enact for the 2014/2015 school year and the 2015/2016 school year. These recommendations are based upon the charge to the committee to ensure that all students will have the skills and attributes necessary to succeed in college and/or their careers. Ironically, as stated in the book How Children Succeed by Paul Tough: "Non- cognitive skills like resilience and resourcefulness and grit are highly predictive of success in college." It is also important to note that these are also traits valued by any employer. The NYSED (New York State Education Department) has provided the research support showing that students need high level reading and math skills to succeed in either college, or in the work place. Having a collective focus on the traits that enable these skills will provide the value added that our students need to be competitive. Initial recommendations from the committee include:

- A mentor program for students phased in starting with the 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade students.
- Summer enrichment program to provide enhanced and extended learning opportunities for all students.
   Parent outreach program to recognize positive student actions in and out of the classroom that exemplify positive character traits associated with life success.
- Additional professional development on working with a diverse student body.
- Making the curriculum relevant.

# **Happenings in the History Department**

### **Mrs. Kuhl-Peterson**

The 8<sup>th</sup> grade Intermediate American History students have spent a busy first few weeks learning how to use iPads and how to use them to master the skills necessary for being a successful history student. We created charts using the app Pages to contrast the differences between the North and the South prior to the Civil War. We also practiced taking notes about the development of the West using Notability. Apps such as VOA Unsettled and Immigration are being used to explore the history of early 20<sup>th</sup> century immigrants and their influence on the development of the United States. Google Drive has provided the capability of communicating assignments and discussion digitally. Technology enriches the classroom.

### Mr. Jackson

HCS Junior students in Mr. Jackson's U.S. History and Government classes had the unique opportunity to take part in a live, interactive Candidate Forum with the two U.S. New York 23<sup>rd</sup> Congressional candidates. On October 9<sup>th</sup> the



student's "connected" with the Republican candidate Tom Reed for an hour long question and answer session. On October 20<sup>th</sup> the Democratic Candidate Martha Robertson met virtually for another student driven discussion. The same questions were asked to both candidates. A question generated by Gabriel Barone focused on college debt loan refinancing and generated a lot of discussion by both candidates. Other questions centered on Ebola prevention, Common Core, natural gas fracking, unemployment in the 23<sup>rd</sup> Congressional District, New York's Safe Act, start up business tax breaks, and controlling rising food costs. Junior, Ethan Bower stated "The video candidate forum with Martha Robertson and Tom Reed was the first exposure to real world politics my peers and I have received throughout our educational process and had

a very positive effect on our understanding on the voting/campaign process."

### **Dr. Satterfield**

While nothing has been definitely decided, NYSED is considering some changes to required Social Studies curriculum and exams. The History Department is prepared for whatever decisions are made and is expanding options for students. For example, we are exploring the possibility to offer a new AP course in World History. Like the current AP US History class, the course can be transferred into college credit, saving students time and parents money. Additionally, many students have voiced an interest to plan an international trip, possibly Europe. If parents support this opportunity, it will be considered.

Lastly, the 10<sup>th</sup> grade Global History students will soon be learning about the world wars. Students will have the opportunity to view the presentation given by the late Richard Falvey, a member of the famed Band of Brothers paratrooper division. If any local residents have personal stories or memorabilia that can add to our study, please contact Dr. Satterfield.

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# SENIORS EXPERIENCE MAD CITY MONEY

The Senior class had the opportunity to participate in a program called "Mad City Money." This program was facilitated by the Corning Credit Union to provide students with an educational budgeting simulation.

Students were paired and assigned to a career, salary, debt amount, and told the size of their immediate family. After a description of the program they were provided with budgeting worksheets and sent out to visit all 9 of the merchant booths. Students had to make choices regarding their financial situation and had options to buy or rent a home, purchase a vehicle, open checking and savings accounts, visit the bank to make payments on debt, purchase entertainment, buy home furnishings and decor, purchase clothing, grocery shop, and plan for childcare services and needs. Mrs. Crane played the role of the Fickle Finger of Fate, where she walked around to students and handed them money for various things they had done or a bill for an unexpected expense. Examples included getting paid for selling items in a garage sale, submitting a picture to a magazine for profit, having a household item break down that needed repair, or having to buy a tuxedo for a friend's wedding. These unplanned short falls had a huge im-

pact on student learning and the understanding of

budgeting. Through this experience students were able to identify and experience the consequences of poor decisions and practice budgeting as an adult with realistic circumstances. Allow-

ing students to practice prioritizing their wants and needs in a safe environment fostered the understanding that budgeting is a necessary step in good money management.

• Remove drawstrings immediately. OR


• Sew a seam through the drawstring at the middle of the hood and neck, so neither end can pull out and catch onto an object.

## Congratulations, Mrs. White!


